Instructions for 2020 Beach District Mini-Grant Application

The Town of Ocean City is accepting mini-grant proposals for Beach District Planting. These plantings are for habitat enhancement, water quality improvement and erosion control. Mini-grants will be a maximum of \$150. There will be up to 20 mini-grants offered. Project sites must be located within the corporate limits of the Town of Ocean City. The deadline for submission is March 1, 2020.

The first 20 Mini-Grant applicants to submit a complete grant application will be notified by March 4, 2020. Plants will be delivered to City Hall around April 10, 2020. All plants must be installed within one week of receipt. A final report must be submitted to the Engineering Department by May 31st which will include photographs and an explanation of the work completed. If you have a project idea, please submit an application in the format described below. Submitted applications will be dated and verified for completeness and eligibility. Once the application is accepted, the Town of Ocean City will notify the applicant of the award. You will be notified of the plant pick-up time, date and location. You will be responsible for plant pick-up, installation and maintenance of the plants. The Town will not be responsible for replacement of dead, dying plant or the long-term maintenance of the plants.

Grant Application must contain:

1. Beach District Mini-Grant Application
2. Site plan at an appropriate scale showing planting scheme and total square foot planting area. Contact the Engineering Department for a site plan of your proposed project area if needed,

Please submit the original paperwork and one copy to the Town of Ocean City, Engineering Department for review. Grant applications must be received no later than March 1, 2020. The deadline may be extended if fewer than 20 grant requests are submitted by the due date. The grant will be closed after 20 complete applications are received. Any submission after this time will be put on a waiting list. Please contact Gail Blazer of the Town of Ocean City Engineering Department at (410) 289-8825 if you have any additional questions.

The projects that are been selected are expected to plant the materials within a week of receiving shipment and keep the plants watered and maintained until planted. It is the sole responsibility of the applicant for installation and maintenance and the Town assumes no responsibility toward maintenance, installation or replacement of dead or dying plant material. Some applicants may be asked to give a brief presentation at one of our City Council meeting or work session.
